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Letter from the President

The letter from the MAS President is intended as a vehicle to inform the general membership of the Minnesota Archaeological Society of recent Board of Directors activities. The following is a brief recap of the events. discussions, and decisions that transpired during the past quarter and future plans.

September is Archaeology Month! MAS members will be involved in programs and activities around the state. Check the State Archaeologist's website for a complete schedule and check our MAS website and Facebook page for updates. Key MAS activities will include:

- Sept. 14 & 15: Archaeology Fair at Fort Snelling State Park. The event will include activities and displays of archaeology around Minnesota and will offer demonstrations of pottery and stone tool making by traditional methods.
- Sept. 26: MAS Lecture at 6pm in the Steele County Historical Society. Bob Suchanek (MAS Board Member) will provide an introduction to his study of stone tools in Steele County.
- Sept. 28: Archaeology Day at Mille Lacs Kathio State Park. The archaeology of the state park will be explored and its key role in the understanding of Minnesota's rich history. Demonstrations and displays will highlight the variety of ways archaeologists pull together multiple lines of evidence to better understand the past.

October will bring the Midwest Archaeological Conference to Mankato, Minnesota. Events and lectures are planned from Thursday October 10th to Saturday October 12th. Key lecture symposia will explore Native American perspectives on Archaeological Practice and results of recent large scale survey studies in Minnesota counties.

This fall we will be completing the Public Television Video "Science and Critical Thinking in Minnesota Archaeology". The public television video is being supported through Minnesota Legacy Grant funds in the Minnesota Historical and Cultural Heritage Program. We are excited to be working with Twin Cities Public Television and are presently in the process of completing filming. We are planning to release the video in multiple forums in April 2020 including your local Minnesota Public Television channel. We are excited to have the opportunity to share in the current public conversation about the explosion of popular culture 'fake archaeology' programs and present what archaeology can tell us about the exciting stories of the people who really lived in Minnesota.

The 2016 issue of the Minnesota Archaeologist will be printed and shipped this fall and the 2017 volume completed later this year. Thank you for your patience.

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In Memory of Christina Harrison

Long-time Minnesota archaeologist Christina Harrison passed away in July at the age of 80. Christina was born in Sweden and attended the University of Uppsala before receiving her training in archaeology at London University, where she developed her distinctive Anglo-Swedish accent. She and her husband immigrated to the United States in the 1960s after he obtained a teaching position at Carlton College in Northfield.

Christina served as adjunct faculty at several schools, including the University of Minnesota, Hamline University and Carlton College. She became one of the founding members of the Council for Minnesota Archaeology in the 1960s, and later formed her own consulting business, Archaeological Research Services (ARS), as one of the first cultural resource management firms in Minnesota.

In the mid-1970s, Christina volunteered to conduct salvage excavations at the Silvernale Site (21-GD-3), a major Mississippian village site near Red Wing that was threatened by industrial development.

She worked throughout the state, doing survey projects for Federal agencies including the Forest Service, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, as well as State and local government agencies and private companies such as land developers. Her interest in history spurred Christina to serve on the Minneapolis Heritage Preservation Committee and become a co-founder of Friends of Minnesota Barns.

Perhaps against her better judgement, Christina conducted three surveys at Runestone Park in Douglas County, the site at which the Kensington Runestone was purportedly discovered. This led her to comment on how irritating she found it when Runestone supporters assumed that, because she was Scandinavian, she would automatically believe that the Runestone was an authentic Norse artifact.

Christina was a colleague, friend and mentor to many in the preservation community in Minnesota. She will be missed.

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Kathio Ceramics from Alexander Lake

Kathio ceramics are from the Late Woodland Period and occur in east-central Minnesota with the most extensive archaeological presence at the outlet of Lake Mille Lacs in Mille Lacs Kathio State Park. According to *A Handbook of Minnesota Prehistoric Ceramics*, Kathio ceramics chronologically occur from 800 to 1200 A.D. They are recovered with Blackduck and Clam River ceramics with which they have been linked, however they distinctly are not found in northern Minnesota. Rims are typically decorated with a cord-wrapped object often over a smoothed surface. The lip may or may not be decorated. Chevrons are often seen, as represented in the two upper sherds here recovered in 2019 from the Lake Alexander site in Morrison County by the Minnesota State Parks and Trails Cultural Resource Program.
